

Ministry of Development North Eastern Region Government of India

Chapter 1

Overview

The Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region (DoNER) was constituted, first as a Department in 2001 and then as a Ministry in 2004, basically for better coordination between the State Governments of North Eastern Region and the Central Ministries/Departments of Government of India. It is the only Ministry with a territorial jurisdiction and functions to coordinate the developmental efforts in the North Eastern Region (NER). The **Vision** of the Ministry is to transform North Eastern Region through development, in sustainable yet accelerated manner, affording comprehensive growth and access to ease of living to all its citizens. The **Mission** of the Ministry is:

- i. Synergize policies, plans and execution for rapid development of NE Region through Collaborating with Central Ministries, States, Agencies & Expert Stakeholders,
- ii. Ensuring full utilization of 10% (GBS) and other budgetary resources for NER,
- iii. Promoting investment in the NER, including public, private, corporate & multilateral funding,
- iv. Developing infrastructure to mitigate connectivity and social sector deficits of the region, and
- v. Strengthening institutions and networks for livelihood, social services, skills and capacity.

To achieve the goal of focused attention to address the special needs of the NE region, the Ministry co-ordinates with various Ministries/Departments primarily concerned with development activities in NER. However, respective Ministries/Departments remain responsible for implementation of programmes in their respective fields.

Subjects allocated to the Ministry:

- 1. Matters relating to the planning, execution and monitoring of developmental schemes and projects of North Eastern Region including those in the sectors of Power, Irrigation, Roads and Communications.
- 2. Hill Area Development Programme in North Eastern Region.
- 3. Non-lapsable Fund for the North Eastern Region.
- 4. North Eastern Council.
- 5. North East Development Finance Institution (NEDFi).
- 6. North Eastern Regional Agricultural Marketing Corporation Limited (NERAMAC).
- 7. The Sikkim Mining Corporation Limited.
- 8. North Eastern Handloom and Handicrafts Development Corporation (NEHHDC).
- 9. Road works financed in whole or in part by the Central Government in the North Eastern Region.
- 10. Planning of Road and Inland Waterways Transport in the North Eastern Region.

Note: While the Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region would coordinate with various Ministries/Departments primarily concerned with development and welfare activities in North Eastern Region, respective Ministries/Departments would be responsible in respect of subjects allocated to them.

The Ministry has also been implementing various Schemes for development of North East Region viz. North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme (Roads)- NESIDS (Roads), North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme Other Than Road- NESIDS (OTRI), Schemes of North Eastern Council (NEC) and Special Development packages (SDP). In the year 2022, the Union Cabinet approved the PM-DevINE Scheme, with total outlay of ₹ 6,600 crore for the remaining period of 15th Finance Commission i.e. from 2022-23 to 2025-26. Salient aspects of implementation of each of these Schemes are given in the following chapters of this report. The schematic budget is very limited and is essential for gap filling schemes and projects.

Over and above, the Ministry also coordinates with other stake holders, who can be from non-government sector or multilateral sector, to work for the development of NER. During 2023-24, MDoNER has taken some major initiatives for coordination and faster implementation of planning & implementation of projects for the development.

To maximize the efficacy of the projects/schemes being implemented by the Government in the North Eastern Region, Government has started the programme "Fortnightly visits of Union Ministers to NER" since 2015. The Ministry anchors and coordinates these visits. To monitor these visits and implementations of recommendations based on these visits, a Dashboard namely "Poorvottar Sampark Setu" has been launched on 12.10.2023.

The MDoNER has set-up state-wise eight **Field Technical Support Units (FTSUs)** in 2022 which work as facilitators on the ground between every State Government and MDoNER for the progress of Schemes and initiatives in NER.

A Mission mode program for **Saturation of Model Blocks & Villages (SAMBHAV)** was conceptualized to enable the most backward and isolated communities to achieve their full potential and become "Atmanirbhar" through equal access to basic services and opportunities.

The **North Eastern Council (NEC)** is a statutory body under the administrative control of the Ministry of DoNER located in Shillong (Assam). As part of its responsibilities for advising, coordinating and reviewing closely in respect of various issues of interest to one or more States of the Region, it inter alia also executes and monitors major Schemes of the Ministry –viz. the "North Eastern Special Infrastructure Development Scheme (Roads)" and "Schemes of NEC" directly.

There are two Central Public Sector Enterprises (CPSEs) under MDoNER, namely, North Eastern Handicrafts and Handlooms Development Corporation Ltd. (NEHHDC) and North Eastern Regional Agricultural Marketing Corporation Ltd. (NERAMAC). The objective of NEHHDC is to develop and promote Handicrafts and Handlooms and allied products of the North Eastern Region and the development of artisans and weavers. The NERAMAC is playing a role of the dynamic and vibrant marketing organization, supporting farmers/producers of NE getting remunerative prices for their produce and enhancing the agricultural, procurement, processing and marketing infrastructure.

North Eastern Development Finance Corporation Ltd. (NEDFi) is a public limited company registered as Non-Banking Financial Company (NBFC) under Reserve Bank of India (RBI). NEDFi plays a key role in development of NER. Its key activities include Project Finance and Micro Finance. It acts as facilitator for setting up new industries.

The Organizational Chart of the Ministry is given at **Annexure - I**.

1.1 Coordination with Central Ministries and Departments

1.1.1 Coordination with other Ministries/Departments of Government of India

The Ministry of DoNER plays a key role in monitoring and co-ordinating development projects for the socio-economic development of the North Eastern Region (NER). It collaborates with various Central Ministries and Departments to oversee the implementation of development and welfare schemes/programs. The Ministry also tracks the utilization of funds allocated for the NER and has designated senior officers to regularly engage with other Ministries/Departments. Additionally, non-exempted Ministries/Departments have appointed nodal officers to coordinate over 10% of the Gross Budgetary Support (GBS) with the Ministry of DoNER and to report on major initiatives in the NER.

In addition to the routine interactions, the Ministry also convened sectoral review meetings with key Ministries such as Railways, Road Transport & Highways, Civil Aviation, Power, Environment, Forest & Climate Change, Tourism, etc. to ensure effective implementation of schemes and timely completion of major infrastructure projects. The Ministry of DoNER is represented in Inter-Ministerial Groups of major Ministries such as MoRTH, Railways, MSME, Home, etc., and is also consulted during policy formation and project implementation stages through EFC/SFC and Cabinet notes.

The Ministry has five Inter-Ministerial Committees (IMCs): (i) IMC on Roads, (ii) IMC on Health & Nutrition, (iii) IMC on Medicinal Aromatic Plants and (iv) IMC on STINER, where issues of importance in these domains are discussed with the Stakeholder Ministries/Departments.

1.1.2 Gross Budgetary Support (GBS): Earmarking of Union Budget by Central Ministries/ Departments for North Eastern Region

In October 1996, the Central Government announced 'Some initiatives for NER'. One of these measures announced was the policy decision to designate at least 10% of Plan Budgets of the Central Ministries/ Departments for the development of NE States. It was decided that Central Ministries/Departments unless specifically exempted (the List of Ministries/Departments which are exempted from 10% GBS are given at **Annexure - II)**, will set aside 10% of their Plan Gross Budgetary Support (GBS) for the NER. Consequently, allocation of funds under 10% GBS for the NER was introduced in 2014-15.

According to this extant policy of the Government, all non-exempted Central Ministries/ Departments (currently 55) are mandated to spend at least 10% of their GBS of Central Sector and Centrally Sponsored Schemes for NER. This is aimed at ensuring a quantum jump in budgetary resource-flow to the region in order to address the existing backlog and gaps in minimum basic services and infrastructure.

MDoNER, being the nodal Ministry, monitors and keeps track of expenditure under mandatory 10% GBS by non-exempted Ministries/Departments through a meticulous system of expenditure tracking. This exercise is being undertaken on quarterly basis and the allocation & actual expenditure figures by respective Ministries/Departments are collected, compiled and forwarded annually to Ministry of Finance for vetting.

The target set-up under 10% GBS for FY 2023-24, calculated as per the Budget Estimate (BE) allocation of participant Ministries/Departments, was Rs 94,679 crore (31% higher than Revised Estimate (RE) 2022-23 of Rs. 72,540 crore). Thus, based on target set-up in 2023-24, MDoNER monitored expenditure by Central Ministries/ Departments under 10% GBS was targeted to cross Rs. 5 lakh crore within a decade from 2014-15 to 2023-24.

The meeting for review of Expenditures of the non-exempted Central Ministries/Departments for the 1st and 2nd quarters of FY 2023-24 was held on 12thOctober, 2023 in three separate groups, with participation of 18 Ministries/Departments in each group. This meeting was jointly Chaired by Shri G. Kishan Reddy, Hon'ble Minister, DoNER, Culture and Tourism and Shri Kiren Rijiju, Hon'ble Minister, Earth Sciences. Another follow-up meeting with 12 selected Ministries/Departments was organized on 21stNovember, 2023 in order to assess the amount of funds for re-appropriation, if any. A second follow-up meeting with selected five good performing Ministries was held on 19thDecember, 2023 under the Chairmanship of Secretary, MDoNER to assess the exact requirement of additional funds for implementation of projects in NER. Further review of expenditures of all non-exempted Ministries/Departments up to the end of 3rd quarter was held in two groups under the chairmanship of Secretary, MDoNER on 16.01.2024 and 21.02.2024. Thus, it has continuously been following up with all concerned Ministries/Departments on this subject and steps were taken to ensure that all Ministries/Departments are able to spend the mandatory 10% of their GBS in the North Eastern Region.

Meetings with some specific Ministries/Departments like-Ministry of New and Renewable Energy, Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Department of Animal Husbandry & Dairying, Department of Drinking Water and Sanitation, those are not able to

spend as per their target – are also being held separately to expedite the implementation of the projects and also the expenditures. Thereby, consistency is maintained in mobilizing developmental expenditure by the Central Ministries/ Departments for the NER.

Resultantly, the annual expenditure under 10% GBS in NER has increased from Rs. 24,819 crore in 2014-15 to Rs. 102,749 crore in FY 2023-24, increasing by almost Rs. 20,059.09 crore (24%) over the expenditure in previous financial year 2022-23. The expenditure in 2023-24 is 111.93% of the targeted RE 2023-24 of Rs. 91,802.01 crore. The cumulative expenditure since 2014-15 till 2022-23 has reached up to Rs. 5,22,080 crore (101.43% of total cumulative RE allocation of Rs. 5.15 lakh crore in the last 10 years, and thus, has well crossed the set target of Rs. 5 lakh crore within a decade, with the annual expenditure in FY 2023-24 increasing substantially by 314% from that in FY 2014-15.

The details of BE, RE and Actual Expenditure under 10% GBS for NER for each year from 2014-15 to 2023-24 as per Table 1.1 of the Union Budget is tabulated hereafter:

1.1.3 Re-appropriation Mechanism

Ministry of DoNER, vide OM No.2 (1)-B(S)-2017 dated 05.05.2017 from Department of Economic Affairs and OM No. 72(08)/PF II/2017 dated 05.05.17 from Department of Expenditure (Annexure-IV), has been delegated the powers to review the quarterly expenditure of non-exempted Ministries and recommend re-allocation of likely surrender to those Ministries/Departments who have the absorptive capacity to implement additional approved schemes/programmes within the financial year.

Regular quarterly review meetings at the level of Hon'ble Minister / Secretary, MDoNER were held to ensure that all Ministries spend the mandatory 10% of their GBS in the NER. Meetings with the Ministries/ Departments which were not able to spend as per their target were held separately in order to expedite the implementation of the projects and also the expenditures.

1.2 Other Key Initiatives

1.2.1 Fortnightly visit of Hon'ble Union Ministers to NE States

Under the guidance of Hon'ble Prime Minister, it was planned that with effect from 5th January, 2015, each NE States would have a visit of a Union Minister in every 15 days in order to accelerate the pace of development in NER and to maximize the efficacy of the projects/schemes being implemented by the Government in the region. In compliance thereof, MDoNER proposes every month, the names of Hon'ble Union Ministers/Minister of State for their visit NE States. MDoNER anchors and coordinates these visits by nominating Union Ministers for visiting NE States by rotation every month, since 2015. These visits are monitored through the reports/recommendations submitted by the visiting Hon'ble Ministers.

The visits are broadly utilized by Hon'ble Union Ministers for:

- Detailed review of programme and policies of Central Ministries/ Departments/
 Organizations for ensuring speedy implementation of flagship and other programs.
- Review of expenditure of the concerned Ministry/Department under 10% GBS
- Review progress of Aspirational Districts in NER.
- Review status of implementation of National Oil Palm Mission recently launched by Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare.
- Interaction with local communities and population and other stakeholders to resolve as many pending issues as possible pertaining to the State/Areas visited.
- Visiting various Institutions, project sites, etc. in/around areas of visit.
- Interaction with State/District machinery and local people to understand and appreciate
 their needs and issues and instruct the concerned agencies to take timely steps for
 resolution of such issues.
- Review of saturation of SAMBHAV districts vis-a-vis State/National average.

74 Union Ministers have visited NER for more than 157 times from January, 2023 to March, 2024. These visits are helping in mapping the aspirations and sentiments of the local population and effective implementation of the projects/schemes of Government in NER.

For streamlining and enhancing monitoring of these visits, MDoNER launched "Poorvottar Sampark Setu" portal on 12.10.2023, which provides valuable insights and graphical information

about State-wise/District-wise visits of Hon'ble Union Ministers in NER. The Portal will be used by all the stakeholders.

1.2.2 Inter-Ministerial Task Force for Agriculture, Agarwood and Tourism sector

> Task Force for Agriculture

Following a joint review of the agriculture sector in the NER by Hon'ble Minister of DoNER and Hon'ble Minister of A&FW, a Task Force on Agriculture was constituted to steer the growth of the sector. Task force has given its recommendations.

It was agreed that MoA&FW would work on implementation of Project on bamboo, have special provisions for enhancing the outlays for NER under RKVY, capacity building and institutional strengthening, promotion of agarwood, expanding scope of MOVCD-NER to allow for a non-organic component. The Ministry is in consultation with all stakeholders for implementation of these recommendations.

➤ Inter-Ministerial Task Force on Agarwood

Agarwood is an emerging sector having very high export potential. The agarwood sector in the NERof India holds significant promise for economic growth and international trade. Recognizing its potential, an Inter-Ministerial Task Force (IMTF) was constituted on 29.11.2023 under the Chairmanship of Shri Angshuman Dey, Joint Secretary, MDoNER to streamline and enhance the agarwood industry in the region towards sustainable development and global competitiveness. Various meetings of IMTF have been conducted to have an insight that despite the high potential for agarwood exports from the region, what are the challenges that have hindered its growth. Couple of interactions were also held with concerned agencies of Indonesia and Malaysia to understand the kind of measures they have taken for becoming the leading international exporters of the agar. IMTF are deliberating on a range of measures to come out with realistic recommendations in the form of policy interventions and formation of a roadmap for sustainable growth of agarwood.

> Task Force for Development of Tourism sector

In pursuance of decisions taken in the meeting of the Consultative Committee for MDoNER in

September, 2022, the constitution of a Task Force for the development of Tourism in NER was proposed. Accordingly, a Task Force was constituted on 20th October, 2023 under the chairpersonship of Joint Secretary, MDoNER. The Task Force comprises members from various Ministries/Departments/State Govt./ Organization/Industry Associations.

The Task Force shall build strategies along with an action plan for the comprehensive and sustainable development of tourism through engagements with stakeholders including those in the private space. It shall study National and Global best practices including digital technologies and recommend their adoption. Its recommendations shall be in convergence and gap filling mode to support sustainable development of tourism. So far 03 meetings of the Task Force have been held on 15.02.2024, 13.03.2024 &04.04.2024.

1.2.3 Mission mode program for Saturation of Model Blocks & Villages (SAMBHAV)

The need for resilient communities is particularly critical in the NER, given the status of its infrastructure, limited resources, ecological profile and the vagaries of nature. To address this, a Mission mode program for SAMBHAV was conceptualized to enable the most backward and isolated communities to achieve their full potential and become "Atmanirbhar" through equal access to basic services and opportunities. This pilot program targets to saturate identified 15 basic services in the 75 Gram Panchayats (GPs) / Villages spread across 42 districts in the NE States. The services selected for saturation are based on National Multidimensional Poverty Index (MPI); and are identified for their potential to afford ease of living to the villagers. Progress on SAMBHAV is sought to be achieved in convergence within the existing schemes of the Government. These are to be monitored on the KPIs against about 20 flagship Schemes of 12 Central Ministries / Departments.

The SAMBHAV programme will thus help these communities in the remote villages of the NE Region seek better governance from the line Ministries and State Governments, through prioritized implementation of their flagship schemes in NER.

Under SAMBHAV, initiatives for developing 'Atmanirbhar Communities' have been conceptualized for improving the overall quality of life, promoting sustainable development providing better healthcare, education, infrastructure, and livelihood opportunities and also to ensure accessibility of basic amenities and saturate all basic services to achieve Sustainable

Development Goals of the villagers with the help of non-state players with local presence apart from the State Governments.

Further, the SAMBHAV Dashboard under 'Pragyan' portal developed by NICSI has been made functional in convergence with 12 line Ministries/Departments and will be launched at the earliest for data monitoring of identified KPIs.

1.2.4 Mission Karmayogi

The National Programme for Civil Services Capacity Building (NPCSCB) aims to embark on a learning transformation program that will help in enhancing the capacity building of civil servants including contractual employees across different ministries, departments and organization.

MDoNER has on boarded itself on iGoT platform and created MDO Admin. Total 99 employees have registered on the portal https://igotkarmayogi.gov.in and have completed 219 courses. Another 65 courses are in line of completion.

Capacity Building Commission (CBC) was constituted in April 2021 to oversee the planning and its implementation of (NPCSCB). CBC has mandate to facilitate the preparation of Annual Capacity Building Plans (ACBPs) for Ministries, Departments, and Organizations (MDOs) of the Government. The Annual Capacity Building Plan of the Ministry of DoNER and NEC has been finalized.

The CBC has empaneled Indian School of Business (ISB) for development of e-learning contents for MDoNER. The modules are aimed at knowing about the schemes, policies, functionality etc of MDoNER to familiarize any viewer with its structure and working.

1.2.5 Advocacy & Publicity

Revised Guidelines of Advocacy & Publicity of the Ministry of DoNER was issued on 06th December, 2023 with an aim to build upon the comparative advantages of the North Eastern Region including up scaling innovations towards spreading awareness and developmental activities that could lead to socio-economic development. The revised guidelines is available in the website of the Ministry (https://mdoner.gov.in/activities/Advocacy-Publicity-guideline)

Proposals that can be taken up under Advocacy & Publicity are:

- i. Road shows and pilot projects to promote, advocate and publicize good practices in the priority areas identified by the Ministry for NER.
- ii. Dissemination and advocacy of information/education on various Govt. programs using ICT and mobile technology with a greater focus on innovations and initiatives designed to benefit relatively more remote, deprived areas and disadvantaged sections of society in NER.
- iii. Business Summits, Conventions, Seminars, Workshops. Consultations, Exhibitions, etc. in domains connected to developmental priorities of the North Eastern Region hosted/co-hosted/sponsored by Ministry in consultation with line Ministries / Departments subject to financial ceiling notified.
- iv. Specialized media campaigns on themes concerning NER like organic farming, cleanliness (Swachata), bamboo, etc.
- v. Web Presence and Media presence of the MdoNER including social media.
- vi. Evaluations/ Impact Studies/Research Studies/ Assessments related to development/ promotion of NE Region.
- vii. Gap Funding in relevant media campaigns etc for NER to other Ministries.
- viii. Calendar events of the Ministry like MDoNER day, Destination North East and other celebrations on important/festive occasions relevant to NER.
 - ix. Any other proposal which the MDoNER views as having intrinsic merit and value.

Ministries of Gol, PSUs of MDoNER, Central universities and colleges there-under (as listed in MoE), State universities / deemed universities (as listed in MoE), Government Institutions of National importance (e.g. IITs/IIMs/BARC, etc.), Reputed Research Institutes, Reputed Media houses (Visual/print) or industry organizations like CII, FICCI, PHDCCI, etc. and Reputed NGOs registered on NGO-Darpan website of NITI Aayog are eligible to apply under Advocacy and Publicity of MDoNER.

1.2.6 North East Investment Promotion

MDoNER planning to organise a 'Northeast Investors Summit' in Delhi to promote trade and

investment in the NER. The Summit intend to provide a platform for an immersive dialogue between select embassies, the business community, financial institutions, and relevant government stakeholders for forging mutually beneficial partnerships. The focus sectors of the summit included Tourism and Hospitality; Agro-Food Processing & allied sectors; Textiles, Handloom and Handicrafts; Healthcare; Education and Skill Development; IT/ITeS and; Entertainment & Sports. As a part of pre-summit activities of North East Investor Summit, various activities were undertaken, which inter alia included 06 State roundtables; Ambassadors' Meet; roundtable with 12 foreign chambers/ associations commerce/industries and 02 embassies; three road shows in Mumbai (29th May, 2023); Hyderabad (3rd July, 2023) and Kolkata (19th February, 2024) and participation of MDoNER along with all the NE States in the Vibrant Gujarat Trade Show 2024. The road shows provided a platform to NE States to

connect with potential investors, and highlight the investment potential of the North Eastern States. The objective of the road shows was to initiate dialogue between interested business houses and Industry leaders with the state government. The road show featured a short formal session, followed by pitch presentations by the State Governments and B2G interactions between the state government representatives and interested investors.

MDoNER organized a MoU signing event on 6th March, 2024 at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi with the presence of Hon'ble Minister, MDoNER and Hon'ble Minister of State, MDoNER. The event served as a platform for the exchange of MoUs between State Governments and investors and was preceded by Business-to-



Government (B2G) meetings. During the event, "Poorvottar Vikas Setu", a tool that will enable the Ministry of DoNER and all the North Eastern state governments to run the entire work-flow online for all the project selection, sanctions, fund releases under all the schemes of MDoNER, was also launched. A total of 52 MoUs were exchanged by Investors with the eight Northeastern states. In addition to the MoUs exchanged, 30 new MoUs were signed in the run up to the summit with the total amounting to Rs. 5,431.06 crore. As a result, a total of 82 MoUs were signed between the State & Investors which amounted to Rs. 30,115.26 crore.

1.3 Schemes/ Initiatives and other highlights of Ministry of DoNER

1.3.1 Development of Physical and Social Infrastructure

The scheme of Non-Lapsable Central Pool of Resources (NLCPR) provides gap funding for creation of infrastructure in the States of NER including Sikkim. The NLCPR Scheme of the Ministry has been re-structured as **North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme** (NESIDS) to meet the gaps in social and physical infrastructure in the region. NESIDS is a 100% Central funded Central Sector Scheme. Hill Area Development Pilot Scheme for development of backward districts of Tamenglong and Noney in the state of Manipuris a sub-scheme of NESIDS, which was introduced during 2018-19 and is under implementation. Under NLCPR-Central - a Central Sector Plan scheme, projects of Union Ministries/Departments, which exceeds 10% GBS expenditure in a year, pertaining to subjects listed in the Union and Concurrent Lists, are being funded. However, no new projects are sanctioned under NLCPR- Central and only on-going projects are funded under the Scheme.

Three Special Development Packages, namely, Bodoland Territorial Council (BTC), Dima Hasao Autonomous Territorial Council (DHATC) and Karbi Anglong Autonomous Territorial Council

(KATC) are also being implemented in Assam to meet the aspirations of the people of the areas under the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution.

North Eastern States Roads Investment Programme (NESRIP), approved in 2011, envisaged construction/upgradation of total 433.42 Km long roads in 6 North Eastern States of Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Sikkim and Tripura.

The North East Road Sector Development Scheme (NERSDS) was launched by the Ministry of DoNER during 2015-16 and a sum of Rs. 450.00 crore was approved for the scheme till March, 2017. Thereafter, the proposal for extension of Scheme beyond March, 2017 till March, 2020 was considered and approved by the Cabinet on 28th March, 2018 with an outlay of Rs. 1,000 crore.

Union Cabinet approved the continuation of Schemes of MDoNER during the remaining period of 15th Finance Commission i.e. from 2022-23 to 2025-26 vide on 05.01.2023.

1.3.2 Livelihoods & Entrepreneurship

The North Eastern Region Community Resource Management Society (NERCORMS), a registered Society under NEC, Ministry of DoNER is implementing various livelihood projects of North Eastern Council in the NER.

Ministry of DoNER provides interest free loans to North East Development Finance Corporation Ltd. (NEDFi) to catalyze industrial growth and nurture entrepreneurship in the North East Region.

1.3.3 Budget Allocation and Expenditure of MDoNER

Against the Budgetary Allocation of Rs. 5,892.00 crore for FY 2023-24, the Revised Estimates has also been kept unaltered, out of which Rs. 1,976.76 Crore was released in implementation of various schemes of the Ministry. The Scheme-wise budget allocation and release for expenditure of Ministry of DoNER during 2023-24 is attached as an Annexure–V.

1.3.4 Welfare of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes

Earmarking of funds by the MDoNER in respect of Development Action Plan for Scheduled Castes (DAPSC) (erstwhile Scheduled Castes Sub Plan) was fixed at 8.3% of schemes budget whereas in respect of Development Action Plan for Scheduled Tribes (DAPST) (erstwhile Tribal

Sub Plan) earmarking of funds was 27.18% of scheme budget for the F.Y. 2023-24 and also for FY 2024-25.

During the FY 2023-24, out of the allocated budget of Rs. 488.00 crore under DAPSC, an expenditure of Rs. 168.88 crore has been incurred, while an expenditure of Rs. 754.30 crore has been incurred under DAPST, out of the allocated budget of Rs. 1,690.00 crore. The details of DAPSC and of DAPST are given in Table 1.2 and in Table 1.3 respectively:

1.3.5 NITI Forum for North East

The NITI Forum for the NE States was set up in Feb 2018 under the Chairmanship of Vice Chairman, NITI Aayog and Co-Chairmanship of the then Hon'ble Minister of State (I/C), Ministry of DoNER to address various challenges in the region and recommend interventions to achieve sustainable economic growth. The members of the Forum include CEO, NITI Aayog, and Chief Secretaries of North Eastern States, Secretaries of key Ministries/Departments, retired bureaucrats, economists and academician.

The first and second meetings of the NITI Forum for NE States were held in 2018 and in the 2^{nd} meeting, panel discussions were held in five key sectors, namely, Tourism, Pisciculture, Bamboo, Dairy, and Tea.

In further line of action, A Joint Working Group (JWG) was constituted by NITI Aayog in September, 2020 under the chairmanship of Secretary/ Special Secretary, Ministry of DoNER. The vice chairman of NITI Aayog selected 09 members for the JWG.

The first meeting of the JWG was held on 18.09.2020, chaired by the then Special Secretary, Ministry of DoNER. The 2ndmeeting of the JWG for NITI Forum was held on 15.12.2020 under the chairmanship of Special Secretary, Ministry of DoNER in which all line Ministries/Departments were inter-alia requested to prepare well documented concrete action plan. The 3rd meeting of the JWG chaired by the Secretary, Ministry of DoNER was held on 29.06.2021. In the meeting it was decided that all line Ministries of NITI Forum except Fisheries may explore the possibilities of a bigger scheme with clear cut financials and timelines towards holistic development plan for NE States in each sectors i.e. Tea, Tourism, Bamboo and Dairy. The 4th Meeting of JWG chaired by Secretary, MDoNER was held on 25.04.2022, in which all

member Ministries/Departments were requested to come up with bigger projects with clear cut outputs, outcomes, employment generation and livelihood opportunities and all NE States shall also be invited to such meetings as direct stakeholders to improve the effectiveness of the meetings and private sector will also be involved in project implementation for resource augmentation and improving service delivery

Chapter 2

Bridging Social and Physical Infrastructure Gaps in NER

The Government has proactively undertaken multiple initiatives to develop new infrastructure and enhance existing facilities in the NER. These initiatives encompass efforts to bolster air, road, rail, waterways, and telecom connectivity in NER through the implementation of ongoing and new schemes/projects by various Central Ministries/Departments/Organizations. The MDONER is spearheading the implementation of vital schemes such as the North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme (NESIDS)-Roads, NESIDS (OTRI), NERSDS programme component, and Special Packages for the Bodoland Territorial Council (BTC), Dima Hasao Territorial Council (DHATC), and Karbi Anglong Autonomous Territorial Council (KAATC). Furthermore, the North Eastern States Road Investment Programme (NESRIP) and the EAP component of NERSDS are being executed with the support of ADB funding. These concerted efforts signify the government's unwavering commitment to driving comprehensive infrastructure development in the region.

2.1 <u>Prime Minister's Development Initiative for North East Region (PMDevINE)</u> Scheme

The Union Cabinet has approved the PM-DevINE Scheme on 12.10.2022. It is a Central Sector Scheme with 100% Central funding, to be implemented by Ministry of DoNER through NEC or

Central Ministries/ agencies for the remaining 15th Finance Commission Period with a total outlay of Rs 6,600 crore for the 4-year period from 2022-23 to 2025-26.

An Empowered Inter-Ministerial Committee (EIMC) under the chairmanship of Secretary, Ministry of DoNER screens, appraises and



recommends project proposals for implementation by appropriate agency. The Committee also monitors progress of sanctioned projects to ensure proper utilization of the allocated funds under PM-DevINE Scheme.

PM-DevINE aims at rapid and holistic development of the NER by funding infrastructure and social development projects based on felt needs of the States. It strives to fill gaps in various sectors and will not be a substitute for existing Central and State Schemes. The objectives of PM-DevINE are to:



- (a) Fund infrastructure convergent in the spirit of PM Gati Shakti;
- (b) Support social development projects based on felt needs of the NER;
- (c) Enable livelihood activities for youth and women; and
- (d) Fill the development gaps in various sectors.

Till 31.03.2024, twenty five (25) projects worth ₹4083.33 crore have been sanctioned out of which one (1) project worth Rs.57.82 crore has been completed and 24 projects worth Rs.4025.52 crore are ongoing under PM-DevINE.

2.2 North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme (Roads) -NESIDS (Roads)


NESIDS is a central sector scheme; which aims to support filling up the infrastructure gaps in identified sectors of the NER such as drinking water supply, power, road connectivity, tourism and social infrastructure in the areas of primary and secondary sectors of education and health. The NESIDS scheme was approved during 2017-18 and was implemented till 31.03.2022. The approval for extension of NESIDS Schemes w.e.f. 01.04.2022 till 31.03.2026 has been accorded by the Government on 4th January, 2023.

During the process of extension of the NESIDS w.e.f. 01.04.2022, the erstwhile NESIDS has been restructured into following two components viz. NESIDS (Roads) and NESIDS (Other than Road Infrastructure).

This component subsumes the projects sanctioned under **NESIDS** (**Road**) (but not yet completed) under its predecessor following schemes:

- (i) North East Road Sector Development Schemes (NERSDS)
- (ii) Road/Bridges projects of North Eastern Special Infrastructure Development Scheme(NESIDS)

The scheme aims to provide specific gap-funding in construction of roads (that are not getting covered under any other Ministry/Department of Government like MoRTH, DoRD, BRO, etc. but are necessary to (a) provide access to remote locations, (b)to markets and (c) from a security point of view.



Till 31.03.2024, 92 projects worth ₹4138.88 crore have been sanctioned out of which 24 projects worth Rs.1142.18 crore have been completed and 68 projects worth Rs.2996.7 crore are ongoing under NESIDS (Roads).

2.3 North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme (Other Than Road)-NESIDS (OTRI)

This component subsumes the project sanctioned (but not yet completed) under its predecessor following schemes:

- I. Non-Lapasable Central Pool of Resources (NLCPR)
- II. North Eastern Special Infrastructure Development Schemes (NESIDS)
- **III.** Hill Area Development Programme (**HADP**)

Till 31.03.2024, 1557 projects worth ₹22396.35 crore have been sanctioned, out of which 1111 projects worth ₹11419.66 crore have been completed and 446 projects worth ₹10944.10 crore are ongoing under NESIDS (OTRI).

2.3(i) Major activities during 2023-24

- (a) State Level Empowered Committee (SLEC) meetings were held in each of the NE States and recommended projects for selection/sanction.
- (b) The Empowered Inter-Ministerial NESIDS/NLCPR Committee meetings were held three times in 2023 and considered the SLEC recommended projects for selection and sanction.

2.3(ii) Allocation of fund to the State

Total amount of projects to be retained in a year depend on the Normative Allocation of the State. Funds under normative allocationare distributed amongst States on the basis of weightage attached which are derived from certain parameters e.g. area, population, human development index, road density, percentage of census etc.



2.4 Schemes of NEC

A Central Sector scheme named "Schemes of North Eastern Council (NEC), fully funded by the Government of India, was under implementation since 10th Finance Commission period and was continued till 31.03.2022 to fill up gaps in overall development of the Region. Schemes of NEC (2022-26) continued unaltered with critical gap interventions in multiple sectors for speedy and holistic development of NER.

The extension of the Scheme w.e.f. 01.04.2022 till 31.03.2026 was approved to be implemented during the 15th Finance Commission (2022-23 to 2025-26) with no major change in the scope/coverage. The Scheme will cover all the eight states of the North Eastern Region. Detailed guidelines for Schemes of NEC were issued on 21st August 2023.

Till 31.03.2024, 1742 worth Rs.12974.93 crore have been sanctioned, out of which 1121 projects worth Rs.9344.67 crore have been completed and 621 projects worth Rs.3630.26 crore are ongoing under Schemes of NEC.

2.5 Special Development Packages

2.5.1 Bodoland Territorial Council (BTC)

A Memorandum of Settlement (MoS) was signed between Government of India, Government of Assam and Bodo Liberation Tigers (BLT) on 10.02.2003 after a series of negotiations with the objective to create an autonomous self-governing body known as "Bodoland Territorial Council" (BTC) in Assam under the Sixth Schedule to the constitution of India to fulfil economic, educational, linguistic aspirations and for preservation of sociocultural and ethnic identity of the Bodos and development in BTC area. The MoS, inter alia, envisaged an additional development package for BTC in order to accelerate the development of the area and to meet the aspirations of the people.

Under BTC package, 65 projects of worth Rs. 749.65 crore were sanctioned, 54 projects worth Rs. 589.13 crore are completed so far and 11 projects worth Rs. 160.52 crore are ongoing.

A MoS has been signed by Government of India, Government of Assam and Bodo Groups (ABSU and NDFB factions) on 27.01.2020.

Under MoS with Ministry of Home Affairs, a sum of Rs.750 crore (Rs 250 crore for three years) has been allocated. 02 projects worth Rs.33.55 crore have been approved for sanction, 3 projects worth Rs 255 crore have been approved in-principle.

2.5.2 Karbi Anglong Autonomous Territorial Council (KAATC)

MoS was signed between Government of India, Government of Assam and United People's Democratic Solidarity (UPDS) on 25.11.2011. As per the MoS, Government of India agreed to provide Special Economic Package of Rs. 350 crore (Rs. 70 crore per annum), over and above Plan funds in the five years to Karbi Anglong Autonomous Territorial Council (KAATC) through Government of Assam to undertake special projects that will be proposed by the Council. So far28 projects worth Rs. 419.44 crore have been sanctioned, 4 projects of worth Rs. 13.14 crore are completed and 24 projects of worth Rs. 406.30 crore are ongoing.

M/o Home Affairs vide their O.M. dated 17.06.2022 informed that additional provision of Rs.500 crore (Rs.100 crore per annum) is required to be made under "Special Package Scheme" of MDoNER as per clause 5.1 of Karbi Accord dated 04.09.2021 for implementation of Special Development Package (SDP) for development of infrastructure in KAATC area of Assam. Under the new package, 02 projects worth Rs.171.97 crore and 01 project of worth Rs.124.05 crore has been approved in-principle.

2.5.3 Dima Hasao Autonomous Territorial Council (DHATC)

MoS was signed between Government of India, Government of Assam and Dima Hasao Daogah (DHD) on 08.10.2012. As per the MoS Government of India agreed to provide a Special Economic Package of Rs. 200 crore (Rs. 40 crore per annum) over and above Plan fund over next five years to DHATC through Government of Assam to undertake special projects that will be proposed by the Council. So far, against the package value of Rs.200.00 crore, for 14projects of worth Rs. 195.80 crore were sanctioned. Out of which, 2 projects worth Rs. 19.87 crore are completed and 12 projects of worth Rs. 175.93 crore are ongoing. An amount of Rs.140.58 crore has been released under the DHATC so far.

2.6 Social and Infrastructure Development Fund (SIDF)

The Union Finance Minister, in his budget speech for 2008-09, announced to set apart a sum of Rs. 500.00 crore (subsequently enhanced to Rs. 586.20 crore) for NER, especially for Arunachal Pradesh and other border areas facing special problems that cannot be tackled through normal schemes. Though the budget of DoNER reflects an indicative provision for this purpose, the amount does not have any additionality in the GBS of the Ministry as the indicative provision is debitable from the Public Accounts.

Projects for entire outlay of the scheme have already been sanctioned, there is no balance left over to sanction any new project. A total of 37 projects have been approved under SIDF and an amount of Rs.561.64 crore has been released so far.

An allocation of Rs.11.00 crore was made at BE which was revised to Rs.5.66 crore at RE stage in 2022-23. The year-wise break-up of the releases are in **Table 2.4.**

2.7 Externally Aided Projects (EAPs)

Externally Aided Projects is an important window for getting funds and technical expertise for development of sectors which are intrinsic to NER. Several agencies such as World Bank, JICA, Asian Development Bank, KfW, GIZ, Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) etc have been funding various developmental projects thereby contributing towards development in the region. External Assistance has gained significance in order to acquire competitive strength under the globalized economic framework for social and infrastructure sectors and has enabled several developmental schemes in the region.

Department of Economic Affairs (NER) has a dedicated portal for processing the application of externally aided project proposals since 01.01.2019. DEA is only accepting the online applications. The guidelines dated 25.11.2019 for posing, implementation and monitoring of EAP for NER are as follows:

For State Sector Projects: PPR should be uploaded on EAP portal, verified by the nodal officer of the State and marked online by nodal officer to all the line Ministries and NITI Aayog for comments/concurrence. If no comments are received by the concerned Ministries within the stipulated time period, it may be assumed that the institution/concerned Ministries/Departments has no comments to offer.

As the Nodal Ministry for NE region, MDoNER's responsibility to ensure that comments from Central Ministries concerned as well as NITI Aayog along with MDoNER's comments are sent to DEA within the stipulated time.

For Central Sector Projects: PPR should be uploaded on EAP portal, verified by the nodal officer of the concerned Ministry/Department and marked by nodal officer to all the line Ministries and NITI Aayog for comments/concurrence. Comments and concurrence of the NITI Aayog and Line Ministries/Departments must be received online within 30 days of the receipt of the

proposal on portal. If no comments by NITI Aayog and other Ministries/Departments are received within stipulated time period, it may be assumed that they have no comments to offer.

After obtaining clearance/comments/NoC, the same is used by DEA for taking final decision on the proposals in the Screening Committee Meeting. Some of the other important guidelines are as follows:

- a) The proposals seeking external financial assistance should generally be aligned with the developmental priorities of the State Government as well as GoI.
- b) For all the externally aided projects, a project implementation team should be established and held fully responsible for the project execution within the approved time and cost.
- c) Proposal for external assistance shall not be sent directly by any Central Ministry or State Government to the bilateral and multilateral funding agencies, the same should be forwarded through DEA.
- d) Project authorities shall improve monitoring of the projects by including comprehensive evaluation of the project both of Performance and impact in the project design itself. Project authorities are expected to submit: (a) project completion report on the physical-financial parameters and (b) evaluation report on the project objective achievement parameters after completion of the project. It is necessary to obtain the approval of the competent authority for the project.
- e) All proposals for TA facility will also submitted by PIAs/State Govt./ Central Ministry concerned in the prescribed format and submit the same on the online portal.
- f) During 2023, a total of 13 project proposals amounting to the tune of Rs. 9202.22 crores were supported by MDoNER and a total of 8 project proposals amounting to the tune of Rs. 3163.96 crores were approved by the DEA Screening Committee for NER in various sectors viz. health, infrastructure, agriculture, power, education, tourism, environment etc., and further posed to the various foreign banks/financial institutions
- g) EAP in the NER was held under the Chairmanship of Secretary of the MDoNER on November 8, 2023 at Vigyan Bhawan Annexe, New Delhi, with participation of representatives from Multilateral and Bi-lateral Development Banks/ International Financial Institutions, Resident Commissioners from seven NE States (excluding Arunachal Pradesh) who attended the meeting in person and senior officers from the NE States and the DEA who joined the meeting through video conferencing.

Chapter 3

Institutions under Ministry of DoNER

3.1 North Eastern Council (NEC)

3.1.1 Introduction

The North Eastern Council (NEC) was constituted as a statutory advisory body by an Act of Parliament under the NEC Act, 1971 (84 of 1971) marking the beginning of a new chapter of concerted and planned endeavor for rapid socio-economic development of the North Easter Region (NER). Over the last fifty years, the Council has played a significant role in ushering development into the region at a time when most of states were in their formative stages. Road and air connectivity was supported, foundations for important regional Institutions were established, and various socio-economic infrastructures were created across the length and breadth of the Region, making a difference in the lives of the people and thereby earning a lot of goodwill in the local community. Presently, NEC is looking to continue its efforts, especially in terms of gap-filling in areas which have escaped the attention of various development agencies, and creating convergence at different levels. NEC is also looking at building capacities, sharing best practices and introducing cutting edge technologies among the NE states.

3.1.2 Major Achievements/Activities of NEC during the Year 2023

During January, 2023- March, 2024, a total of 204 projects were completed. List of projects completed during this period is given at Annexure-VII and the list of major projects (Rs 10.00 crore and above) completed during this period are in Annexure-VIII.

3.1.3 <u>5G</u> Applications in NER:

The project titled "5G Applications in NER with hub at Amtron, Guwahati" was sanctioned by NEC in FY 2022-23 at a total cost of Rs.14.96 crore and inaugurated by the Hon'ble Minister, DoNER on 28th September, 2023. As per the vision outlined by the Hon'ble Prime Minister during the Golden Jubilee Celebrations of NEC in Shillong on 18th December 2022, that North

East should capitalize "AshtaLakshmi" for development of this region wherein one of the key

components was optimal utilization of 5G Technology. NEC has funded and already rolled out the following components in 08 States of North East as under:



- a) 5G Training Labs 1 unit in each of the 08 States of the North East.
- b) MOOC Courses on 5G duly certified by Telecom Sector Skill Council.
- c) 5G Use Case Applications -Healthcare Education, Cane & Bamboo

d) Awareness amongst stakeholders.

In addition, the process of setting up a 5G Experience Center at Tech City, Guwahati by AMTRON, a PSU of Government of Assam, has been completed and which shall act as a Hub for spokes in other NE states. The details of the project can be seen at our project website **nec5g.org**. The project has also established many First's for the nation to emulate as under:

- a) The 5G Lab for Agri Use Cases in College of Agriculture, Central Agricultural University Located at Pasighat, Arunachal Pradesh shall be the first 5G Lab to deploy use cases in Agriculture.
- b) The 5G Lab at North-Eastern Hill University (NEHU), Shillong, Meghalaya shall be one of the country's first 5G Lab to train disabled people for integration into fast growing telecom economy. This project has collaboration with ALIMCO, a PSU of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India as well as State Resource Center for Disability Affairs, Government of Meghalaya.
- c) The 5G Use cases for Cane and Bamboo being deployed with help of North East Cane & Bamboo Development Council (NECBDC) and School of Planning & Architecture (SPA), New Delhi shall pave way for MSME Ministry to evolve and replicate the same across India to improve livelihoods / promote Vocal for Local for lakhs of women artisans involved in this trade.

- d) The 5G Labs shall help the youth from North East to gain skills relevant to Industry 4.0 and take optimal advantage of fruits of knowledge economy which can help NE to improve many of its gaps in SDG 2030 Goals.
- e) AR / VR Based Anatomy Learning Models in Government Nursing College, Pasighat, Arunachal Pradesh is also one of the first to be introduced in a Nursing College in the India.

3.1.4 North-East Resource Centre (NERCEN)

NEC, as advised by Hon'ble Prime Minister in his address during the 65th NEC Plenary Meeting held in 2016, established North-East Resource Centre (NERCEN) to act as a catalyst for the development of NER by facilitating the creation of the right mix of opportunities, manpower, technology, sector focused growth and by providing a strategic policy vision for the region.

3.1.5 <u>Digital Design Labs for Livelihood Generation:</u>

The project titled "Digital Design Labs for Livelihood Generation" was sanctioned by NEC in 2022-23 at a total cost of Rs. 4.99 Crore. The primary objective of the project is to train local youth in the identified areas to acquire the required digital skills to get gainful employment in the knowledge economy/digital economy. Digital Design Labs have been set up in the following two locations:

a. Asufii Christian Institute, Mao, Manipur: - The first batch of 24 students have completed the course on 6th September, 2023. Campus Recruitment for the passed-out batches were conducted on the 8th and 9th of November 2023 at the Institute with 4 Companies participating. 13 students have been selected by the companies

through the placement program and they will be working as interns in the respective participated companies. Admissions for the 2nd Batch of 24 students for the Course has also started and all students have been enrolled.

b. **Don Bosco Technical School, Shillong Meghalaya**: - The first batch of 24 Students have completed the course on 6th September, 2023. Campus recruitment for the passed-out batches is under process.

3.1.6 Inter-Ministerial Group (IMG) on Exports:

The NEC has taken a significant step to enhance foreign trade in the NER by constituting an Inter-Ministerial Group (IMG) under the Chairmanship of Secretary, NEC with members from different Ministries including MEA, MoCA, Railways, AAI, MSME etc. The IMG focuses on streamlining and improving foreign trade activities in the region. Since the formation of IMG, the NEC has been actively conducting a series of meetings, with stake holders both from private sector and government sector, to address various aspects of foreign trade.

The primary objective of the IMG is to identify and mitigate bottlenecks that hinder foreign trade in the NER. Additionally, it is tasked with addressing issues related to the production, value addition, and challenges at the border. Some of the Ministries have reported on the actions taken to fulfill their respective KPIs, reflecting a commitment to addressing challenges and promoting positive developments in foreign trade within the region.

This concerted effort by NEC through the IMG underscores a holistic approach to catalyze positive changes in the foreign trade landscape of the NER. By bringing together relevant ministries and setting clear KPIs, the NEC aims to identify and overcome obstacles, facilitate value addition, and address border-related issues, ultimately contributing to the overall economic development of the NER.

3.1.7 71st Plenary of North Eastern Council

The 71st Plenary of the North Eastern Council (NEC) was held on19th January, 2024 at State Convention Centre, Shillong, Meghalaya under the Chairmanship of Hon'ble Union Home Minister and Chairman, NEC. Hon'ble Union Minister of MDoNER and Vice-Chairman, NEC and Minister of State, MDoNER along with the Members of the Council attended the meeting. Chief Ministers and Chief Secretaries of all the 8 NE States participated in it. During the Plenary, NEC Year Book, 2024 was released. Report on activities of NEC during the year 2022-23, presentation on action plan of NEC for the year 2023-24 and progress on preparation of NEC Vision 2047 document by Secretary, NEC were laid. Brief presentation was made on ideas and thrust areas for NER to focus on by NEC on the Investment Policies/Programmes in NER States, Industry 4.0 for NER, strengthening of logistics in NER, strengthening of logistics in NER and

Inter-regional trade/import substitution/export. The issues of the NER were addressed by Hon'ble Union Home Minister followed by the other dignitaries.

3.2 North East Cane and Bamboo Development Council (NECBDC)

North East Cane and Bamboo Development Council (NECBDC) [erstwhile Cane and Bamboo Technology Centre (CBTC)] is an ISO 9001:2008 certified organization and was established in the year 2000 as part of Cane and Bamboo Technological Up-gradation and Networking Programme of United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) where the Department of Science & Technology (DST), Govt of India and the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) were the main stakeholders. NECBDC was registered as a Society on 21st July 2004 with Secretary, NEC as the Chairman. NECBDC has been steadfast in its commitment for the development of the bamboo and cane sector, particularly for the NEr. The activities of NECBDC for the period January 2023 to March 2024 are as under:

3.2.1 Capacity Building & Skill Development

The NECBDC in collaboration with Govt. agencies and reputed empanelled NGOs conducted training programmes on 'Cane and Bamboo' products within the NECBDC campus and at various locations in the NE States from January 2023 to March 2024. Total Artisans trained were 1998. The list of trainings funded by NEC and other agencies are in Annexure-IX and Annexure-X respectively.

3.2Central Public Sector Enterprises (CPSEs) under administrative control of Ministry of DoNER

3.3.1. North Eastern Handicrafts and Handlooms Development Corporation Limited (NEHHDC)

In 1977, The North Eastern Handicrafts and Handlooms Development Corporation Ltd (NEHHDC) was established at Shillong, Meghalaya with the mandate of promotion and development of handicrafts and handlooms sector of NER by connecting craftsmen to prospective markets. It has been providing Marketing support through procurement of handlooms products directly from the artisans, weavers, self-help groups at clusters and selling the same through its chain of "Purbashree" Emporia located at Shillong, Guwahati, Kolkata, New Delhi and Gujarat and through sales promotion offices located at Chennai and Bangalore and also through conduct of various exhibition and marketing events all over the country. The Corporation also conducts training programmes and seminars for skill and knowledge upgradation of the artisans and weavers.


The initiatives and achievements of the NEHHDC during the period of 1st January, 2023 to 31st March, 2024 are as under:

- i. **Training and Development** in the field of Skill Development Programs, Entrepreneurship, Seminars, Workshops, Awareness Programs, and Road shows;
- ii. Advisory & Consultancy in Development of Comprehensive Management;
- iii. Information System, Database Support, Project Reports and DPRs, Project Management Support;
- iv. Marketing and Others like promotional activities, events, exhibitions;
- v. Marketing, Strengthening of Purbashree Outlets; &
- vi. **Mentoring and Handholding** of Entrepreneurs through sector specific industry leaders and organizing master classes on specific traits of the sectors.


NEHHDC Projects: NEHHDC is implementing the following projects under schemes of NEC,

which will go a long way in bridging the gaps in the handicrafts & handlooms sectors in the North East India, and providing livelihood to the artisans & allied workers, which are detailed below:

a. Establishing ASHTLAXMI HAAT & EXPERIENCE CENTRE at Guwahati with a project cost of Rs. 7.6 crore. The Haat will have 24 permanent stalls which will provide a market access to artisans of all Northeast states & will also have an artisan residency to provide accommodation to artisans from out station.



b. Setting up an Eri silk spinning plant at Integrated Textile Park, Mushalpur, Baksa (Assam) with a project cost of Rs. 14.92 crore. It is envisioned to provide direct employment to 375 individuals and provide indirect livelihood to approx. 2500 households. The plant once commissioned will have a production capacity of 450 Kgs of Eri Silk Yarn per day.



- c. Providing market development by way of digitalization, authentication and traceability covering 10,000 weavers across 7 states (except Sikkim) in NER with a project cost Rs.14.92 crores. It is estimated that through this intervention there will be an increase in the income of weavers by 20-30 % in the next 2-3 years. As a part of the project implementation more than 10,000 active looms weavers have been identified and registered from NE states except Sikkim.
- d. Livelihood Business Incubators (LBI), the Corporation has received sanction for the establishment of Jewellery and Handicraft Incubation Centre in NEHHDC under the ASPIRE Scheme of Ministry of MSME, Govt. of India with a budget out lay of Rs. 1.9 crore. The following machines are being procured through the GeM portal:

IX.NEHHDC has established Center of Excellency in collaboration with Apparel Made-Ups & Home Furnishing Sector Skill Council at Garchuk, Guwahati for conducting job oriented courses on Apparel Management Courses.

X.The Corporation has signed an historic MoU with Haryana Tourism Corporation, Government of Haryana for partnering as Focus Region (NER) for the next five years in Surajkund International Craft Mela to offer a unique, platform for artisans from the NER to showcase their exquisite handcrafted products,



traditional art forms, and rich cultural heritage to a global audience.

XI.The Corporation has established a textile testing laboratory, at Garchuk, Guwahati for testing fibre, yarn and fabric.

XII.The Corporation has established one Calendaring unit for finishing of hand-woven textile.

XIII.Two Design Card Punching and Auto CATD systems have been installed along with jacquard card punching machines *at CPEC-Garchuk*, *Guwahati*.


3.3.2 North Eastern Regional Agricultural Marketing Corporation Limited (NERAMAC)

NERAMAC was incorporated in 1982 as a CPSE. It functions under the administrative control of the **MDoNER**.

NERAMAC has been envisaged and is functioning as not just a marketing agency for farmers and entrepreneurs, but also undertakes agri-horti projects, skill curriculum supplies inputs, GI produce registration, user authorisation and promotion activities, agri-events and assists in setting up of horticulture value chain (food processing) etc to holistically approach the aspect of agri-horti development.

A revival package for NERAMAC was approved in August 2021. The Corporation has performed remarkably in the year 2022-23 by achieving the turnover of Rs. 110 cr. against the set target of Rs. 64 Cr. (Revival Plan Target) and also registered the net profit of Rs. 4.27 Cr after a decade. For the FY 2023-24, as per the provisional data, the Corporation has generated revenue of more than Rs.40 Cr. with net profit of Rs. 2.00 Cr.

➤ **Procurement of Agri-horti Produce:** Procurement and marketing of more than 427 MT of agri-produces like Pineapple, Avocado, Black Rice, Cashew nut, Large Cardamom, Cinnamon, Maize and Black Pepper etc. under its umbrella **brand 'NE Fresh'**. Apart from the above, several market linkages to entrepreneurs and FPO/ FPCs were also provided.

NERAMAC has product basket of 150+ products in the retail segment.

- 30 nos. of local entrepreneurs/MSMEs associated with NERAMAC for branding and marketing of their processed products.
- Retails products marketed through 12 stalls/retails outlets of NERAMAC covering 7 cities/towns including 2, One Station One Product (OSOP) stalls at Kamakhaya and Dimapur Railway Two kiosks were stations. opened International Check Posts in Tripura bordering Bangladesh.



- Supply of agri-inputs and planting materials on behalf of State Governments Vermi compost, Bio-Fertilizers, Rhizomes, Agri-shade net etc is ongoing.
- b. Implementing Agency.
- Formation and Promotion of FPOs in NER: Under 'Formation and Promotion of 10,000 FPOs under the Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Govt. of India. 208 FPOs have been formed across NER covering over 19,000 farmers. This number is likely to cross 40,000 by Q1 of 2024-25 as the FPC would be fully mobilized.
- Bamboo Plantation Project of State Bamboo Development Agency (SBDA), Govt. of **Assam:** 900 ha of plantation in the three districts of Assam has been completed with 3.30 lakh saplings and 750 farmers beneficiaries.
- G.I. Registration of Agri-Horti produces of North East Region: During the year, NERAMAC has facilitated the User Authorization registration of 1,308 farmers of the NER for all 13 G.I.

registered Agri-Horti products. This activity was unique in many ways for the region and saw active participation by the producers, state department officials and Agriculture/Horticulture ministries of States.



- Setting-up of 5 Cold storages in Bodoland Territorial Region (BTR), Assam: Five contemporary technology cold storage plants have been established by NERAMAC in Bodoland Territorial Region, Assam.
- NERAMAC has also successfully implemented a project of setting up of Dragon Fruit Processing Plant at Aizawl, Mizoram and a minor processing plant for Assam Lemon in Dibrugarh, Assam.

c. Skill Development & Livelihood Training.

NERAMAC facilitated the conduct of training programmes and certification for farmers and rural entrepreneurs to enhance their productivity and income. Different sectors covered during the year are:

- Agri-Horti & Agri-Allied
- Food Processing Training
- Rubber Sector

Through skill training programme more than 7,900 individuals have benefitted thus far.



A target of 30,000 as Recognition of Prior Learning certification and over 8,000 as Special Project has been awarded by MSDE in early December 2023. Training for the same has commenced.

d. Events

During the year NERAMAC participated/organized 17 events, covered around 2,000 farmers/entrepreneurs.

e. Revival of Processing Plants:

During the year, Cashew Processing Plant (CPP) of NERAMAC at Agartala was made operational with fund support from NEC and the Integrated Ginger Processing Plant (IGPP) at Byrnihat, Meghalaya has been revived under PPP mode.

Chapter 4

Livelihood & Entrepreneurship

4.1 North Eastern Region Community Resource Management Society (NERCRMS)

The North Eastern Region Community Resource Management Society (NERCORMS) is a society under North Eastern Council (NEC), Ministry of DoNER for implementation of development projects in the NER of India. The Society successfully implemented three phases of NERCORMP project i.e. (a) NERCORMP-I from 1999 to 2008 jointly funded by Govt. of India and IFAD (b) NERCORMP-II from 2010 to 2017 jointly funded by Govt. of India and IFAD and (c) NERCORMP-III from 2014 to 2021 with funding from Govt. of India only.

The NERCORMP-I&II were implemented in 6 districts in 3 states i.e. Karbi Anglong and Dima Hasao districts of Assam; Ukhrul and Senapati districts of Manipur; West Garo Hills and West Khasi Hills districts of Meghalaya and NERCORMP-III in 4 districts in 2 States i.e. Changlang and Tirap (including Logding) districts of Arunachal Pradesh; Chandel and Churachandpur districts of Manipur. During three phases of NERCORMP, the society formed 2,889 Natural Resource Management Groups (NaRM-G), a village planning and implementation organisation), 8,403 Self Help Groups (SHGs), 290 NaRM-G Cluster Associations, 300 SHG Federations covering 1,18,843 households in 2,532 villages. Total investment from Govt. of India for the 3 phases of NERCORMP was Rs. 731.28 Crore (Total investment including fund from other agencies, support from financial institutions and community contribution was Rs. 970.94 crore).

NERCORMS today continues implementation of development interventions beyond NERCORMP covering all States of NER of India with sanction/allotment of additional projects/schemes of NEC beyond 2021.

4.1.1 Additional Projects under NERCRMS

The Society is currently implementing various schemes of NEC such as promotion of low chilling apple plantation; establishment of stabilized interlocking block Making Enterprises; Organic tea cultivation in Tamenglong; promotion of agarwood plantation; value addition of Naga Chilly and other spice crops for Market readiness through vacuum drying technology; Organic Tropical Fruit Tamenglong, Manipur; Construction of a Multipurpose Hall cum Badminton Hall & Futsal playground at Saikot, Churachandpur, Manipur and Development playground at Pillangkata-Maikhuli, Ri-Bhoi; Construction of New office building of the Lyngdoh of HimaSobing village, East Khasi Hills, Meghalaya and Construction of Cultural Centre in Emesiiphro Village, Senapati, Manipur etc. In the course of implementation of these projects, various trainings/capacity building in the relevant areas are imparted both on-site and offsite.

4.1.2 Planned activities for the Financial Year 2024-25 (April 2024 to March 2025)

The present on-going additional projects are promotion of Medicinal and Aromatic Plants (MAP) based livelihood opportunities in the NER to augment rural income and promote resilient livelihood opportunities through the establishment of an entrepreneurial ecosystem, promotion of commercial bamboo plantation in the NE India, Organic Tropical Fruit Tamenglong, Multi Agriculture Allied by NERCRMS in Manipur and Nagaland, Multi Agriculture Horti activities in Manipur and Meghalaya, Tourism Circuit Development in Senapati District, Manipur, promotion of tourism in North East using Digital Tools, Establishment of Stabilized Interlocking Block Packing Enterprises in NE States etc. The Society will continue implementing these projects of NEC which are under progress and will also endeavor and take up new projects with a target to fill the critical gap in livelihood sector on the basis of problem statement identified through bottom-up approach.

4.2 North Eastern Development Finance Corporation Ltd. (NEDFi)

North Eastern Development Finance Corporation Ltd (NEDFi) is a public limited company established in the year 1995 under the Companies Act 1956. It is notified as a Public Financial Institution under Section 4A of the said Act and is registered as a Non-Banking Financial Company (NBFC) in 2002 with RBI. The core business of the Corporation comprises lending activities (fund based) and fee-based activities. The lending activities are undertaken through the project finance schemes and microfinance schemes. The Corporation also provides fee based advisory & consultancy services to the Central and State governments.

NEDFi has been playing an important role in facilitating setting up of new industrial and service sector projects in the North Eastern States. The status of sanctions and disbursements during the period January 1st, 2023, to March 31st, 2024, is given below. During the period under reference, the Corporation extended financial assistance to 8,459 projects with total sanctions & disbursements of Rs. 1,002.68 crore and Rs. 866.26 crore respectively, facilitating capital formation of Rs. 2,443 crores. Various sectors financed were hotels & tourism, healthcare, education & training institute, food processing, hand looms & handicrafts, microfinance etc.

4.2.1(i) Micro Finance

The "NEDFi Micro Finance Scheme" was launched by the Corporation to assist the grass-root small borrowers in un-served and under-served areas of the North Eastern Region. Through the Scheme, the Corporation provides wholesale micro credit to Micro Finance Institutions (MFIs) of the region for on-lending to low-income individuals for carrying out various income generating activities in farm and non-farm sectors. NEDFi also launched another Scheme named

"NEDFi Micro Lending Scheme" to provide financial assistance directly to Micro Entrepreneurs, through Business Correspondents, for setting-up / expansion of their income generation activities.

During the period under reference, the financial assistance extended under the scheme is Rs 44.05 crore. As on 31.03.2024, the corporation has extended financial assistance of Rs. 1,035.15 crore to NGO-MFIs/NBFCs from eight NE States, which touched the lives of more than nine lakh beneficiaries. More than 90% of the beneficiaries under the scheme are women which has enabled them to improve their economic status and move up above the poverty line. 4.2.4 North East Venture Fund (NEVF)

NEDFi in collaboration with the MDoNER has set up the North East Venture Fund (NEVF), a dedicated venture capital fund for the region, to encourage start-ups in the NER. The capital commitment to the fund is Rs.100 crore (MDoNER Rs.45.00 crore through NEDFi as an interest free loan, NEDFi Rs.30.00 crore & SIDBI Rs. 25.00 crore). The fund has generated a lot of enthusiasm among the start-ups from the region. As on 31.03.2024, a total of 68 start-ups were given investment commitments for Rs.101.42 crore. Its noteworthy achievements encompass several NEVF-funded startups surpassing 100 crore in valuation, generating 10,000 + direct and indirect employment opportunities in the North East. Building on the success of

NEVF, NEDFi has facilitated the creation of state-specific venture funds, with commitment for contributions towards the proposed corpus of each fund and fund management. This initiative has led to the establishment of funds such as "Manipur Startup Venture Fund" a ₹ 30 crore initiative for startups in Manipur in collaboration with the Government of Manipur, and "NRL Ideation Angel Fund", boasting a corpus of ₹ 40 crore in association with Numaligarh Refinery Ltd, a subsidiary of Oil India Ltd. Similar initiatives are underway in collaboration with the Governments of Assam, Tripura, Sikkim and other states from NER. Further, NEDFi has given in principal commitment of ₹ 25 crore to Government of Assam for their venture fund and also intends to contribute ₹ 15 crore in Government of Tripura fund.

4.2.5 Promotional & Developmental activities undertaken by NEDFi:

Techno Economic Development Fund (TEDF) Study: NEDFi conducts various techno economic feasibility studies for the NER. A total of 107 studies have been completed so far. Some of the recent studies include: "NEC Yearbook 2024", "Resource Mapping of the Bodoland Territorial Region (BTR) and Pre-Investment Feasibility Study for Preparation of a Development and Investment Plan for BTR- 2022", "Skill Gap Study of Sikkim with special focus on the MSME sector in the state", "Study on factors impeding the growth of bamboo sector in NER and preparing a roadmap to make it vibrant sector in NER economy" and "Scope & Prospect of Oil

Seeds and Coarse Cereals Cultivation in Mizoram with special emphasis on Emerging Market Opportunities, Value Addition and Supply Chain Management".

Nodal Agency Role: The Corporation is a nodal agency for disbursement of Central Subsidies under NEIP 1997, NEIIPP 2007, Freight Subsidy Scheme 2013, etc. which is administered by the Department of Industrial Policy & Promotion, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India. As on 31.03.2024, an amount of Rs. 9,641.80 crore was released under various Central Subsidy Schemes. The Corporation is also nodal agency under "Mission organic value chain development for North Eastern region (MOVCDNER)". MOVCDNER is the key initiative of Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare, Government of India to support the farmers in taking up value chain processing activities (Post Harvest infrastructure creation).

Business Meet: NEDFi conducts Business Meets, in all the NE States, for the first-generation entrepreneurs to disseminate information on various schemes and programmes, with the objective to develop variety of skills and attributes such as the ability to think creatively, work in a team, manage various risks etc. So far, a total of 9,140 participants have been benefitted.

Business Facilitation Centre: Mentoring assistance is extended primarily to the first-generation entrepreneurs on managerial, technical, financial, commercial & marketing, preparation of project reports and credit linkages, through Business Facilitation Centers of the Corporation in all the NE States. So far, a total of 8,338 entrepreneurs were nurtured, out of which credit linkage was extended to 2,301 entrepreneurs.

Capacity Building Support to NGOs: In Micro Finance, Capacity Building is a continuous exercise and to cope up with the changes& developments in the sector, the functionaries and staff of NGOs/MFIs need to continuously upgrade their knowledge and skill sets. NEDFi assists these NGOs/ MFIs by providing such capacity building programmes. So far, a total of 1,707 participants have benefitted.

NER Data Bank: The NER of India is known for its vast natural resources and is a cauldron of different people and cultures. Information about this region, though available from various resources, is scattered. To address it NEDFiis maintaining a web-based portal called "NER Databank" with a view to provide information about North East India at a single source. Data on various sectors are being updated regularly. The details can be browsed at http://db.nedfi.com. data is available upto district level on resources available, infrastructure,

agriculture, tourism, industry, potential sectors for investment etc. In addition, NEDFi also publishes Databank Journals on various sectors related to the economy of the NER. So far, 61 issues of Data Bank journal have been published.

Sustainable Livelihood Programmes: NEDFi undertakes various initiatives to organize programmes on various trades for providing alternative sustainable livelihood to the artisans in water hyacinth craft, handloom & handicraft sectors etc. The objective of conducting such programmes is to ensure that the participants are able to learn successful strategies and acquire appropriate tools for self/ wage employment. They will also be able to contribute towards poverty alleviation of their community. So far, a total of 1,2054 artisans have benefitted through various programmes.

4.2.6. The North East Bankers' Conclave 2023

MDoNER in collaboration with the NEDFi organized "The North East Bankers' Conclave 2023" on 28.4.2023.

The conclave marked first of its kind leadership event, bringing together various stake holders from the banking and finance sector, policy makers, and regulators to brainstorm the challenges faced by the banking sector in the region and to deliberate and come up with some immediate and long-term actionable strategies to address issues at various levels, from the policy planning and up to the grass-roots level of implementation, thereby promoting equality and economic growth in the region.

The four specifically themed panel discussions on credit flow to (i) Agri & Allied Sector, (ii) MSMEs & Startups, (iii) Implementation of Central Schemes by Banks, and (iv) Issues in Banking in the North East minutely assessed the performance, prospects, and challenges faced by the banking and financial services industry in the NER.

During the discussions Stakeholders highlighted that the government in collaboration with the banking fraternity will focus on developing a strong banking infrastructure, enhancing financial literacy, and creating a digital ecosystem in NER, for improving financial inclusion. Proactive collaboration of all stakeholders – Policy makers, Bankers, Regulators, Industry experts, entrepreneurs, and the wider business community – was emphasized for implementing the transformational strategies.







4.2.7 FIELD LEVEL TECHNICAL SUPPORT UNIT (FTSU)

Ministry of DoNER Region in the year 2022 has designated NEDFi as a Nodal Agency for Field Level Technical Support Units (FTSUs) in NE States for maintaining and updating database of all the Government of India Schemes/Programmes and also field level assessment of Schemes, Programmes and Projects funded by MDoNER and NEC in the region.

The roles and responsibilities of FTSUs are:

- 1. Aiding the State Governments in ensuring that project proposals are aligned with guidelines of the Schemes of MDoNER/NEC.
- 2. Support the State Government in preparation of good quality DPRs to help State Governments benefit from Central Government schemes and to fully utilize 10% GBS in a manner relevant to the local needs.
- 3. To have regular Meeting with the concerned State Planning & Coordination Departments to review Schemes & Projects of MDoNER and NEC.
- 4. Maintaining and updating the database of all the Schemes, Programmes and Projects funded by MDoNER/NEC.
- 5. Regular Co-ordination with the State Governments at various levels on the progress of Schemes, Programmes and Projects funded by MDoNER/NEC.
- Regular interactions with Project Implementing Agencies to understand the progress, issues and bottlenecks and achievements on Schemes, Programmes and Projects funded by MDoNER/NEC.
- 7. Providing feedback to MDoNER on regular basis on the progress, issues and bottlenecks and achievements on Schemes, Programmes and Projects funded by MDoNER/NEC.

- 8. Submission of Progress Reports to MDoNER/NEC.
- 9. Co-ordination with MDoNER on the visits of Ministers/Senior Officials/VIPs etc.
- 10. Other activities incidental to coordination and assessment of these Schemes/Programmes/Projects/visits etc.
- 11. Co-ordinate with MDoNER and Central Government Ministries and also to provide monthly feedback to MDoNER on progress of important Central Government Projects.

Present Status of FTSUs:

- NEDFi has put in place Monitoring teams in each state of NER comprises of three members. One State Monitoring Co-ordinator and two Project Associates, one for Physical Infrastructure sector and other for Livelihood Sectors in each State for Monitoring the Progress of the Schemes/Projects in their respective states. At the HQ level, two AGMs who in close co-ordination with top management of NEDFi look after four States each.
- For the position of State Monitoring Co-ordinator, NEDFi has identified suitable recently retired official in the rank of Director/Joint Director in the respective States who has good knowledge of development works going on in their states with good liaisoning abilities.
- Reconciliation of project wise data maintained by MDoNER and NEC with the State Planning Department.
- Help and guide Implementing Agencies (IAs) and for opening of ZBSA account, mapping in PFMS, submission of ZBC and remittance of unspent balance to CNA.
- Different projects funded by MDoNER and NEC are being visited and inspection reports are prepared and being sent to MDoNER and NEC.
- Visited IAs to collect UCs, CCs and other relevant documents of various projects funded by MDoNER and NEC and are being sent to MDoNER and NEC.
- Field visit and submission of reports for projects under PM-DevINE, NESIDS (Roads),
 NESIDS (OTRI), Special Packages and Schemes of NEC in all the North-Eastern States.
- FTSU's have regularly Review Meeting with State Planning Department to update themselves on the projects preferably, once a month. The Records of Discussion/Minutes of the Meeting are forwarded to MDoNER for information and further necessary action.

• FTSUs update the status of projects on "Poorvottar Vikas Setu" portal and upload the Photographs in the portal on a monthly basis.

4.2.8 North Eastern Development Finance Corporation Limited (NEDFi) as Central Nodal Agency (CAN) for the Central Sector Schemes of MDoNER:

Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure vide DEO's OM no. 3/(08)/PFMS/ 2022 dated 13.06.2022 has designated NEDFi as Central Nodal Agency (CNA) for revised procedure for flow of funds under Central Sector Schemes (Model 2) for M-DoNER. NEDFI has also been designated as CNA for PM-DevINE Scheme Model 1 vide MDoNER (Finance and Economic Affairs Wing) OM no. E and P-12/3/2022-O/0 US(E&P) part-1 dated 9th November, 2022.

Presently, NEDFi as CNA is looking in the flow of funds for the following Central Sector Schemes and Packages:

- I. Schemes of North Eastern Council
- II. North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme
 - NESIDS (Roads)
 - NESIDS (OTRI)
- III. Prime Minister's Development Initiative of North East Region
- IV. Special Package for Bodoland Territorial Council
- V. Special Package for Karbi Anglong Territorial Council
- VI. Special Package for Dima Hasao Territorial Council
- VII. Social and Infrastructure Development Fund: (Till 31-03-2023)

In this regard, based on various Office Memorandums (OMs) and SOPs issued by Ministry of Finance (DoE), O/o the CGA, PFMS, Ministry of DoNER and NEC Secretariat, NEDFi as CNA has been carrying out various activities as mandated for smooth functioning of transaction for each of the scheme/packages under Central Sector Schemes of MDoNER & NEC. The activities carried out by NEDFi as CNA by and large includes the following:

(i) Assisting Sub-Agencies (SAs) in understanding the modalities of CNA transaction, right from opening of Scheme-wise Zero Balance Subsidiary Account (ZBSA) under Model-II and opening of assignment account in RBI for schemes under Model-I.

- (ii) Setting of Scheme-wise and State-wise drawing limits to SAs under Model-II and transfer of Assignment limits to SAs for Schemes under Model-I through PFMS. Regularly monitoring the utilization of Scheme-wise drawing and assignment limits.
- (iii) Regularly following up with the Sub Agencies to collect and update the State-wise, Scheme-wise and Project-wise expenditure details received from various SAs.
- (iv) Monitoring of Scheme-wise expenditure details through PFMS (CNA-01, CNA-02 &CNA-6 module for Model-2 and CNA M1/TSA module for Schemes under Model-1).
 Reconciliation of CNA-01, CNA-02 and CNA-06 report with CNA bank statement.
- (v) Regularly transferring the unutilized/unspent balance of various SAs through PFMS to Consolidated Fund of India (CFI), as and when Authorization Letters are received from MDoNER/NEC.
- (vi) Regularly monitoring and reconciliation of drawing limits set for CNA for onward setting of drawing limit to SAs vis-a-vis amount available in CNA account under each Scheme.
- (vii) Transfer of Interest earned on the saving accounts of CNA to Consolidated Fund of India through PFMS.
- (viii) Preparation & submission of status of project-wise unspent balance lying in CNA to respective PDs of MDoNER & NEC

The CNA team is dealing presently with approx. 580 Nos.of Project Implementing Agencies spread across 8 (eight) North Eastern States and other parts of the country on regular basis in connection with the activities related to flow of funds to these agencies based on the authorizations received from MDoNER & NEC for the above mentioned Schemes and Packages funded by them.

Till 31-03-2024, a total authorization of Rs. 3,353.56 Crore was issued to CNA by the respective PDs of MDoNER and NEC, out of which a total of Rs. 2,632.15 Crores was utilized through PFMS by the SAs mapped under CNA.

In order to carry out these activities, NEDFi has formed a separate specialized team consisting of Nodal Officer, Project Manager, Project Associates, Project Executives and Data Analysts. This team is under the regular supervision of top management of NEDFi for transparent, effective and 'just-in-time' disbursement of funds as per the extant guidelines and procedures as notified by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India.

4.3 Science & Technology Intervention North Eastern Region (STINER)

The Ministry of DoNER with the close collaboration of the office of the Principal Scientific Adviser (PSA) to the Government of India initiated *Science & Technology Interventions in the North East Region* (STINER) in 2017-18 as a mechanism for synergy between technology and users. STINER supports appropriate technology dissemination of field-tested technologies from S&T institutions to the farmers/ artisans of NER which helps in augmenting economic development/livelihood in the NER. The STINER Project was officially transferred to NEC, Shillong from Ministry along with a budget Provision of Rs. 40 crores in June, 2016 for sanctioning funds to implement the project by CSIR-NEIST, Jorhat. STINER has been proposed to be implemented in Hub & Spoke mode, where STINER-hub is started at CSIR-NEIST, Jorhat and a STINER-spoke is to be established at every NE states. Already, STINER-Spoke at SASARD, Nagaland has been established and six other STINER spokes project for the state of Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Manipur, Tripura and Sikkim have been submitted, presented, reviewed and sanctioned. However, due to non-submission of the work order for more than a year from the date of sanction, and as per the NEC Guidelines, the projects were cancelled.

The STINER Hub project is now fully operating under incubation mode in addition to training and demonstration. Some of the successful products/technologies under commercial production from STINER Hub are:

1. Paper Based Products (Egg Tray): Egg tray is prepared from recycled paper. STINER hub introduced the technology of making egg tray from recycle papers. The technology is already demonstrated to many entrepreneurs and two entrepreneurs are now preparing egg tray from recycle papers commercially and are selling to different layer farms of the region.

2. <u>Layer Farm:</u> The STINER Hub layer farm named Poustik was inaugurated by Prof Ram Gopal Yadav, Chairman, Parliamentary Standing Committee of Govt of India on 11 April, 2023. The layer farm is now fully functional with capacity of 4,500 layer bird. The layer farm is now supplying eggs directly to consumers, retailers and wholesellers forming a strong business network and providing reasonable employment opportunity.

The layer farm with separate layer house, grower house and brooder house is capable of supplying not only eggs, but also ready to lay chicks for poultry farmers and produce manure. Layer excreta of the STINER layer firm is found to contain considerable nutrients.

3. <u>Bamboo Based Products: board, agarbati stick, furniture:</u> In bamboo processing unit, couple of incubatee have been preparing several products including craft, cups, water bottles, furniturs etc. The incubatees are selling their products in the market and they also are preparing different items as per the demand.

<u>Weaving unit:</u> Fifteen weaving unit with jacquard facilities are installed at STINER Hub. The facility is also expanded with other accessories required for weaving. Computer punching card for the jacquard is also installed to support the local design and assamese *Gamocha* are commercially prepared by the trainined women SHG.



4. Paper Cup-Plate: The paper cup-plate machine is incubated by young entrepreneur and the product is selling in the market.

STINER Products in the market: Several products prepared by the incubatees in the STINER Hub facilities are already in market. The products like eggs from the layer firm are popular in some parts of Assam (Jorhat) and Nagaland (Mokokchang). Other products like paper glass & plate, low cost honey bee



Low cost honey bee box, technology developed under STINER project transferred to NGO and the NGO is selling & distributing among women beekeepers box, bamboo craft, *gamocha*, egg tray, manure from layer bird are regularly selling by the incubatees in the market.

Awareness & Trainings: Several trainings and awareness programs under STINER project have been conducted among the students, entrepreneurs and farmers. The programs are focused on highlighting the STINER facilities and their importance for the target groups. Awareness on entrepreneurship by utilizing facilities for young entrepreneurs has been made. NGOs, SHGs, FPC, farmer's clusters, students, young entrepreneurs are attempted to motivate towards entrepreneurship during the awareness and training programs.

Food Testing Facility: One food testing facility has been established under STINER Hub. Several important quality parameters of food like protein, fat, dietary fiber, ash, texture, colour, amino acid can be estimated and already more than one thousand samples have been tested. The facility is also used to test the honey quality parameters. Protocol of estimation of tea poly phenol, phytochemicals of aromatic plants, bioactive compounds of medicinal plant, HMF, C4 sugar of honey have been established under the facility.

STINER Spoke Nagaland

AI technologies have been established at School of Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development (SASRD), Medziphema, Nagaland, which is the STINER Spoke of Nagaland. The technologies are



used for demonstration and incubation. Multiple units of the technologies like banana fiber extraction have been established at SASRD and SHGs & villages like Ghile Society, Niuland District; Kashanyu Baptist Youth, Tseminyu District; Chekiyie Village, Chümoukedima District; Rotomi Village, Zunheboto District; Shisaajem SHG, Mokokchung District benefitted from the technology.

Four incubatees are involved in incubation of multipurpose dryer by drying king chili. Mushroom spawn production, vermin-composting, packaging unit, layer farm is also used for exhibition, demonstration and incubation. Several training and awareness programs are conducted in Nagaland for the STINER Spoke.

4.3.1 New STINER Projects:

Six new projects submitted by IITs/other institutions under STINER initiative were presented in the 3rd STINER steering committee meeting held on 25-03-2021. The Committee felt that these projects are appropriate low cost, apposite, strengthening livelihood of rural people of NER and approved these projects. After technical validation by CSIR-NEIST, the projects are being sanctioned in 2022-23. These projects are applicable for NER as it can also help in betterment of Livelihood, S and T for Traditional Drink/Wine, Value addition/ Value Chain, Agriculture – Soil health, Crop Yield Water management- Health / Field. The selected new projects are detailed below:

I. Taraltec Reactors for improving access to clean drinking water:

The innovative Taraltec: Maji® Reactor requires no consumables, no electricity, no chemicals, no filters or membranes, no maintenance or supervision, and with a one-time fitting (retrofitting takes less than an hour with no special tools or training, by the local plumber), can ensure a plus 99 percent physical kill of microbial contamination to eliminate waterborne diseases like diarrhea. The objectives of the project are to: -

- ➤ Provide a simple, low cost, easy to install solution for purification of water from bore-well hand-pumps which is commonly used in rural areas.
- ➤ Provide access to safe water, free from harmful microbes instantly, from borewell handpumps for masses in rural areas in the North -Eastern States.
- > Eliminate water borne diseases.

II. Treadle Pump Jalkund coupled with Drip kit:

The project aims to bring affordable, robust and efficient irrigation at the marginal farmers' farm, treadle pump coupled with Drip Kit enhances water to use it efficiently in the rain-fed and hilly areas of NER. With the availability of water, farmers could adopt vegetable crop in the Rabi season.

- III. Sabjee Cooler to improve the shelf life of produce: Subjee Cooler works on the principle of evaporative cooling and does not require any utilities. The low temperature and high relative humidity inside the chamber preserves vegetable crop (non-tuber crops) for short period of time. It reduces the post-harvest losses among Vegetable/ Fruit Cultivators in the target area and provides better shelf life helps to avoid distress sales and poor price for produce
- IV.Development of Fruit Wines from selected NE fruits: The project aims to develop and optimize wine making process from selected North-East fruits at 1-5 L fermenter scale as well as to evaluate wine prepared from different fruits in term of chemical composition, aroma, shelf life etc.
- V.Technology intervention on traditional rice beer of NER: Rice beer apart from having potential for income generation on entrepreneurial level, has potential for livelihood for many unemployed men and women in the NER. The objective of the project is to optimize and standardize the traditional rice beer (jou) scientifically for commercial viability.

VI. Soil Organic Carbon detection kit to analyze soil fertility:

The soil organic carbon is recognized as an overall fertility indicator and has been affected over a period. The kit reagents are safe and farmer can easily do the test at an affordable cost at the field. The increased outreach of the technology would help the farmers in restoring soil fertility. Need based fertility improving suggestions would be provided through BARC/ KVKs/ IIT Guwahati, expertise etc.

Chapter 5

Information, Communication and Technology Activities

Information and Communications Technology has been strengthened in Ministry of DoNER to assist planning, execution and monitoring of various development schemes and projects in the NE Region. In addition, ICT has been utilized to monitor major projects implemented in NER region by various other ministries. Also support has been provided to various organizations viz. NEC, NEDFi, NERAMAC, NEHHDC etc.

5.1 MDoNER Website

MDoNER website viz.

https://mdoner.gov.in has been certified by STQC (Standardisation Testing and Quality Certification) for GIGW 2.0 (Guidelines for Indian Government Websites) compliance.



5.2 POORVOTTAR VIKAS SETU

There were two existing Portals https://nlcpr.mdoner.gov.in/ and https://nesids.mdoner.gov.in/ for managing projects related to all the Schemes of DoNER leading to hardships. An Integrated portal called **Purvottar Vikas Setu** has been designed & developed, and



was launched by Hon'ble Minister, MDoNER.

It is a Management Information System (MIS) designed to monitor and enhance the efficiency of development projects in the NE states of India. It contains 2 portals and 1 Mobile Application.

Pre Sanction Portal:

The main purpose of this portal is to automate the process of Projects from Proposal phase to Sanction phase. All the 8 NE states can submit their project proposals to the ministry using this portal. It has a work flow-based system.

Post Sanction Portal:

This integrated system seamlessly combines data collection, processing, and analysis functionalities, providing insights into the physical and financial progress of developmental initiatives. Key features include a centralized project database



housing comprehensive information on ongoing, completed and closed projects, from timelines to financial allocations. The MIS ensures that stakeholders can access up-to-date information on infrastructure development, utilizing geospatial visualization for enhanced spatial analysis. It incorporates user access control through role-based permissions, and robust reporting tools, offering customizable reports and dashboards. **Poorvottar Vikas Setu** plays a pivotal role in fostering transparency, accountability, and informed decision- making for the sustainable development of the NE region.

Mobile Application:

A Mobile Application is also developed for Post Sanction Monitoring activity performed by FTSU's of North East States who physically visit and monitor the Progress of the project. This app has the facility to update physical progress, images of project, tender details, project location etc by FTSU.

5.3 POORVOTTAR SAMPARK SETU

Giving momentum to developmental activities in the region in line with working towards realizing Hon'ble PM's vision of 'Ashtalakshmi', Hon'ble MoS, MDoNER, launched the 'POORVOTTAR SAMPARK SETU', a powerful portal to make Ministerial visits to NER, more effective, transparent and impactful. The portal provides valuable insights and graphical

information about State wise/ District wise visits to NER. The portal generates a curated list of 24 Hon'ble Ministers who are scheduled to visit the North-East in the next upcoming month.

After their visits, the Hon'ble Ministers can submit their tour reports along with their

recommendations on the portal. After



analyzing the recommendations, MDoNER can forward the recommendations to respective line Ministries/Depts/State Govts for quick action. These efforts will ensure that benefits of central schemes reach to the last person in NE India.

5.4 MDoNER DASHBOARD

MDoNER dashboard viz. https://mdoner.gov.in/dashboard/ has been revamped and upgraded, wherein information on all the projects of the Ministry is available.



5.5 On-boarding of new schemes in MIS portals

New Schemes PM-DevINE, Schemes of NEC and NERSDS (submerged into NESIDS- Roads) were on-boarded into Project portals vizhttps://nesids.mdoner.gov.in for post approval monitoring of the Projects.

5.6 NER PRAYAS INTEGRATION

As per the direction of PMO, a dashboard has been developed for very large ongoing infrastructure and social projects costing implemented in NER by various Ministries/ Departments and linked with PMO Prayas Dashboard portal.

Monthly progress of KPIs of 51 Nos of shortlisted ongoing projects in NER are published and monitored.

5.7 MDoNER Data Analytics Dashboard

To promote growth, development and empower NER like never before, Hon'ble MoS, MDoNER, launched the 'MDoNER Data Analytics Dashboard' for the Development of NER. The Dashboard will help in Data driven decision making, Ease of operations, Centralized

monitoring, Policy level decision tool, and Information integration. The Dashboard has data of 141 schemes across 55 Departments and Ministries. The dashboard will keep a close watch on



NER aspirational districts, NE border districts and the most backward districts of the region. The Dashboard will benchmark key performance indicators of schemes in NER. Equipped with latest innovations in e-governance, the Dashboard will display information across multiple departments and ministries on a single platform.

5.8 Compliance to cyber security guidelines

The Indian Computer Emergency Team (CERT-in) has issued guidelines relating to information security practices, procedures, prevention and response to all the government entities. The guidelines are also available on website of Ministry of Electronics & Information Technology (MeitY) and CERT-In. Instructions have been issued to all concerned in MDoNER for strict compliance of said guidelines.

Endpoint Detection and Response Utility:

To Strengthen the Cyber Security in the Ministry, Endpoint Detection and Response (EDR) tool has been installed in all the nodes connected to ministry network. EDR is a cyber security technology that continuously monitors devices to detect issues and respond to cyber threats like ransomware and malware.

5.9 Upgradation of e-Office to version 7.3.9 & DSC Integration

In order to improve productivity, transparency in the decision making, e-office was upgraded to version 7.3.9 with additional and advanced features to improve efficiency in day to day office activities. Along with upgradation of e-Office for Authenticity of File Movement, Digital Signature Certificate (DSC) is also integrated in all the e-Office accounts of officer in the Ministry.

Chapter 6

Vigilance, Official Language & Staff Welfare

6.1 Vigilance

Vigilance matters relating to the Ministry as well NEC Secretariat, two Public Sector Undertakings (NERAMAC and NEHHDC), and NEDFi are handled by Vigilance Division of the Ministry. The Division is headed by a Joint Secretary, a Deputy Secretary and other subordinate staff. Vigilance related activities are carried out within the framework provided by the Central Vigilance Commission and Department of Personnel & Training.

The Vigilance Division also functions as a link between the Ministry and the Central Vigilance Commission and other Authorities in matters pertaining to vigilance. The CVC and the DoP&T, in their effort to bring about a greater transparency in vigilance administration and speedy disposal of cases, have been suggesting several measures through their administrative instructions. Various instructions received from CVC and DoP&T from time to time have been circulated amongst all Chief Vigilance Officers/Vigilance Officers of the organizations under the administrative control of the Ministry for strict compliance.

6.1.1 Vigilance activities during 2023-24

The Vigilance Division monitors the disciplinary cases and related matters of the organizations under the Ministry through periodical returns prescribed by CVC and DoP&T etc. Prompt and appropriate action has been taken on the fresh complaints received in this Ministry during the year. Appropriate necessary action has also been taken for speedy disposal of pending cases. Advice of CVC was taken in cases wherever it was necessary. Vigilance clearance certificates were also issued in respect of the officers and officials of this Ministry keeping in view the guidelines.

6.1.2 Celebrations of Vigilance Awareness Week

Vigilance Awareness Week was observed from 30thOctober, 2023 to 05th November, 2023 with the theme "Say no to corruption; commit to the nation" in this Ministry and in the Organizations under the Ministry. As per schedule, Vigilance Awareness Week began on 30.10.2023 at 11:00 A.M. with a pledge administered by Secretary, Ministry of DoNER which was taken by all

officers and staff of the Ministry. During the Week, adequate numbers of banners/standees were placed at different locations in the Ministry to create awareness about the year's theme amongst the staff and other visitors. Creatives on preventive vigilance were also posted on social media accounts of the Ministry. Quiz, poster and essay competition on the theme "Corruption free India for a developed Nation" were organized for the officers/officials of MDoNER to raise awareness about the theme of Vigilance Awareness Week. Prizes were also conferred on the top three winners in each category.

Details of the activities which took place during Vigilance Awareness Week 2023 are as follows:

- (i) The Vigilance Awareness Week commenced with the Integrity Pledge being administered by Secretary, MDoNER on 30.10.2023 at 11.00 AM at MDoNER's Committee Room/Video Conference.
- (ii) All officers/staff took e-pledge by visiting the website. Online "Integrity Pledge" was available at CVC's website (www.cvc.gov.in)
- (iii) A poster competition (in Hindi and English) on the theme "Say no to corruption; commit to the Nation" was held in which many staff members participated actively.
- (iv) An essay writing competition was held on the theme "Government initiatives: Driving Vigilance in Public Service" which was participated by staff of the Ministry.
- (v) A quiz competition was held on vigilance awareness wherein many officers and staff participated.

Other activities:

- i.Workshop on 'Public Interest Disclosure and Protection of Informers (PIDPI)' was conducted on 02.11.2023 at 03:00 pm in committee room of MDoNER by an external subject expert, Smt. Simmi Nakra, CVO, Power Finance Corporation Limited.
- ii.Quarterly Performance Report to CVC on the online portal was submitted regularly.

6.2 Audit Para

No audit paras from Comptroller & Auditor General (CAG) and Public Accounts Committee (PAC) are pending in respect of Ministry.

6.3 Official Language Policy

Hindi Division of the Ministry has been entrusted with the nodal responsibility for implementation of the Official Language Policy of the Government of India, the Official Language Act and Rules made there under. There is an Official Language Implementation Committee under the Chairmanship of Joint Secretary, which monitors the progressive use of Official Language in the Ministry as well as in the offices under its administrative control. As per the policy, quarterly meetings of the Committee were organized in the year 2023-24 and action was taken on the decisions/recommendations made by the Committee.

In order to monitor the implementation of Official Language Policy of the Union and for necessary assistance in translation work in the Ministry, there exist the posts of one Deputy Director (OL), one Assistant Director (OL), one Senior Translation Officer and one Junior Translation Officer in the Ministry.

During the period, all the documents falling under Section 3(3) of the Official Language Act were issued bilingually. All the letters received in Hindi were replied in Hindi. Besides, a Hindi Pakhwada was organized in the Ministry from 14th September to 28th September, 2023 and various Hindi competitions were organized. Quarterly Hindi Workshops are also organized in the Ministry to overcome the difficulties faced by the staff in the implementation of the Official Language policy. During the workshops, the visiting scholars guide the participants about Hindi noting, drafting, Hindi typing and other aspects of Hindi language.

The meeting of Hindi Salahkar Samiti of the Ministry of DoNER was organized on 9th January, 2024 in Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi under the Chairmanship of Sh. B. L. Verma, Hon'ble Minister of State in the Ministry of DoNER. The Members of the Samiti gave valuable suggestions and inputs for accelerating the use of Hindi in official work of the Ministry and its subordinate offices/undertakings.

6.4 Staff Welfare

6.4.1 Welfare of SCs/STs/OBCs/Minorities and Physically Handicapped persons

This Ministry is fully committed for maintaining highest standards of excellence and transparency in addressing the grievances of the people belonging to these categories and their

overall socio- economic empowerment by making provision of SCSP/STSP in its budget. Shri Sandeep Singh, Deputy Secretary MDoNER has been nominated as the Liaison Officer for SCs/STs/OBCs in the MDoNER. Shri Sandeep is assisted by the Officers/Staff posted in Establishment Section, MDoNER in discharging his duties as the Liaison Officer.

6.4.2 Welfare of Women

Government of India enacted Sexual Harassment of Women at Work Place (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 that seeks to protect women from Sexual harassment at their place of work. The Act envisages constitution of a Committee namely "Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)" headed by a woman officer at a senior level from amongst the employees. In accordance with the stipulated norms, MDoNER reconstituted the ICC vide office order dated 27.03.2023 read with office order dated 24.11.2023 to look into the complaints of sexual harassment at workplace.

6.4.3 Celebration of International Women's Day

In accordance with the guidelines issued by Ministry of Women and Child Development, International Woman's Day was celebrated with great fervor and enthusiasm in M/o DoNER, Vigyan Bhawan on 8thMarch, 2023. To create awareness about International Woman's Day amongst the officers/staff, adequate display of material regarding women empowerment in the form of banners/posters/selfie points were placed at different locations in the Ministry.

A pledge wall was created in MDoNER with the slogans regarding women empowerment written on the same by the officers and staff of the Ministry. Various sessions/activities on the women empowerment related subjects were organized in which guest speakers were invited and officers and staff of MDoNER participated.

6.4.4. Welfare of Person with Disabilities

The building of the Ministry is owned and maintained by Central Public Works Department (CPWD). The building has provision for barrier free accessibility to persons with disabilities. This includes provision of ramps, rails, lifts, adaptation of toilets for wheelchair users etc.

The schemes implemented by the Ministry of DoNER through NE State Governments are primarily relating to the infrastructure gap fillings in the infrastructure sectors namely, roads





Subject: Exemption from mandatory 10% expenditure of GBS in North Eastern Region-regarding.

This is with reference to OM No.117/DS(Budget)/2017 dated 15.05.2017 and 27.09.2017 from Department of Fertilizers, on the above mentioned subject.

- 2. It is observed that Department of Fertilizers had no allocation in RE 2016-17 & BE 2017-18 as per Statement 11. In addition, though fueds were allocated under Statement 23 in years 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17 at BE stage and also at RE stage in year 2014-15, the Department of Fertilizers has reported 'Nii' expenditure for these years. Therefore, one of the criteria of exemption applied in the case of 17 exempt Ministries, wherein Ministry/ Department can be exempted if expenditure in NER is NIL during last three years, is applicable in this case. Accordingly, Department of Fertilizers may be exempted from mandatory 10% expenditure of GBS in North Eastern Region (NER).

OFFICE MEMORANDUM

Subject: Utilization / Re-allocation of funds earmarked of the implementation of schemes for North Eastern Region.

The undersigned is directed to say that Group of Secretaries on Transport and Communications Sector while reviewing "Ideas for Budget 2017-18". suggested that Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region be given the mandate for enforce Non-Lapsable Central Pool of Resources. It was also suggested that Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region be authorized to reappropriate from Ministries unable to spend the 10% allocated for the North Eastern Region to Ministries who have exhausted their allocation and in need additional funds. Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region, it was suggested, also be empowered to utilize unspent balances for committed liabilities.

2. Ministry of Finance has examined the recommendation and observed that Rule 10 of the Delegation of Financial Powers' Rules 1978 (DFPR) (amended from time to time) does not allow inter-ministerial re-appropriation of funds. To actualize the spirit of the recommendation, the following mechanism has been worked out:

(a) Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region shall review the allocation /

expenditure in North Eastern Region by various Ministries/ Department.

(b) All the Ministries/Departments shall provide scheme-wise expenditure in first half

(e) Department of Expenditure (Plan Finance Division) will analyze the actual

requirement of the Ministries / Department of Economics Affairs (Budget Division),

with the approval of Secretary.

(f) Department of Economics Affairs shall consider the Ministry / Department- wise

requirement and make provision of additional finds/curtailing the funds, while

communication the RE ceilings.

Based on this, DoNER shall firm up its proposals and send it to the Department of Expenditure before the commencement of RE meetings so that the same can be considered at the RE stage by the Budget Division.




